As we reflect on a year of accomplishment and innovation, we look forward to what's ahead. Working with our partners on and off campus, we are dedicated to collaborating and building new opportunities for students and the communities we serve.

INVOLVEMENT& PERSISTENCE

The Division of Student Affairs provides students with countless opportunities to build friendships, grow personally and engage in experiences that prepare them for life beyond graduation. Student involvement in these activities has a direct, positive impact, as evidenced by increased persistence, higher enrollment and improved graduation rates.

This year, we tracked data from over 4,000 events, highlighting the expanded reach and influence of our Student Affairs programs.



98% INVOLVED

Percentage of OSU freshmen who participated in a co-curricular event, with 87% participating in five or more events.



3.3X MORE LIKELY TO RETURN

Students who participated in at least three co-curricular events were over **three times more likely to re-enroll** at OSU the following year.



699,852 TOTAL PARTICIPATIONS

This includes involvement in events and programs among all students during the 2023-24 academic year.



HIGHER GPA

Freshmen who participated in a student organization had an average **GPA of 3.4**, and students active in our residential life living learning programs averaged a **3.3 GPA**.



12,909 IN STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

The **475 active student organizations** on campus saw
involvements from students across
all academic colleges.



91% RETENTION RATE

Students who lived on campus in our living learning programs had higher retention rates than the general campus population.

MENTAL HEALTH& WELLNESS

The wellness approach in Student Affairs involves making a connection between health, learning and student-wellbeing. The mental health of our students continues to be a top priority for the Division. The prevention efforts coupled with clinical services make a significant difference in the lives of students.

Access to mental and physical health services is more important than ever. These programs and services allow OSU to provide much-needed support to our Cowboy Family.



COUNSELING

University Counseling Services provided 9,022 in-person counseling sessions to 1,173 OSU students—an increase of 810 total in-person counseling sessions over the previous year.



WELLNESS

89% of freshman cohort students participated in at least one event or program through the Department of Wellness, and 58% of all students—freshmen through graduate students—participated in wellness-related programs.



ACCESS TO SERVICES

Virtual counseling options were established through partnerships with Betterhelp and Togetherall. We conducted 418 virtual counseling sessions with 122 students across the OSU system through Betterhelp.



PREVENTION

Student Wellness was awarded a \$60,000 grant to promote mental health and substance abuse prevention across Oklahoma. The grant was provided by the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.



HEALTH SERVICES

University Health Services provided 17,347 medical visits, 23,109 prescriptions, 1,889 X-rays and 13,611 inhouse laboratory tests.



MONETARY SUPPORT

Over \$300,000 was raised to support student mental health across the OSU system through the Cowboys United for Mental Health Campaign.



PROFESSIONAL PREPAREDNESS

OSU graduates demonstrate career readiness by embodying a diligent work ethic and effectively implementing their experiences of collaboration, problem solving, and communication. Graduates embrace agile learning for lifelong career development in an ever-expanding diverse and global workplace.

SUPPORTING THE IDEAL GRADUATE

Every student comes to OSU with a dream for their future. Along the way there are Student Affairs professionals who work with them as they walk the path of career discovery and preparation. In addition to the excellence delivered through degree attainment, our students achieve success through certain specific competencies developed through their learning experience, allowing them to impact their communities as servant-leaders.

Our graduates exhibit an understanding of their role in positively impacting the lives of others and graduate with knowledge, skills, values and abilities that enrich their lives.



PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY

Personally responsible graduates demonstrate the ability to navigate challenging situations, display an understanding of personal and career-relevant finance, strive to expand knowledge base, and/or express resilience in problem-solving. Much of this is achieved through student employment, career exploration and graduate assistantships.

STATE OF ORANGE A DAY OF COWBOY SERVICE

Held in April of 2024, the inaugural State of Orange: Cowboy Day of Service saw more than **3,500 volunteers across the state of Oklahoma and beyond**. Cowboys came together to live out the Cowboy Code and help those in need.

To achieve greater impact, State of Orange partnered with **Into the Streets**—a semi-annual student event in the Stillwater area focused on one day of meaningful service each semester.

Participants answered the call to volunteer at more than **350 event locations nationwide**, demonstrating how the university's land-grant mission extends beyond the classroom and into the community.

STUDENTSUPPORT

As students balance academic and other life commitments, it is important they feel a consistent foundation of physical, psychological and social support. The Division of Student Affairs provides the people and programs to meet students' needs so their studies can continue uninterrupted. The Division has developed resources to anticipate both unexpected and ongoing needs and deliver these to students in a timely manner.

Our programs and services provide vital support to students and are a prime example of OSU's Culture of Care.

SERVED THROUGH STUDENT ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

Student Accessibility Services offers academic support services to **students with disabilities**. This academic year, **131 students** receiving SAS services graduated.

Student received various scholarships including \$141,889 in housing scholarships and \$15,000 in scholarships for first-generation college students.

IMPACTING OKLAHOMA

In keeping with OSU's Land-Grant Mission to serve the state of Oklahoma, the Division of Student Affairs is home to grants and initiatives aimed at improving communities and populations throughout our state. These programs exist to improve the lives of Oklahomans through topics such as improving accessibility, healthy living and substance abuse prevention. In addition, Student Affairs continues to be good stewards of state appropriations and drivers of revenue on campus.

Awarded in community wellness funding through 16 grants, saving Oklahoma communities an estimated \$26.3 million.

DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

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
